Quaker Service

Quaker Service began some fifty years ago in 1969 when Friends in Belfast took practical action to provide shelter at Frederick Street Meeting House for families left homeless due to sectarian violence. Now Quaker Service has returned to Frederick Street to develop community outreach and provide services in North Belfast, demonstrating faith in action.

Through its volunteer led Quaker Connections programme, Quaker Service provides practical and emotional support services for prisoners across Northern Ireland. Working in partnership with NI Prison Service and Probation Board NI as well as other agencies, our aim is to reduce recidivism through volunteer befriending for prisoners with little or no family contact and the delivery of tailored programmes that motivate personal development across key life areas, fostering a healthier emotional state and smoother community reintegration.

Our shared concern: Justice, fairness, and opportunity are not experienced equally by everyone in our community.

Our Purpose: Led by Quaker values, to provide services that give support and effect change.

Our Vision: A community in which each individual is valued, their voice heard and their need addressed

Ireland YM is a member of the Friends World Committee for Consultation (FWCC) through the Europe & Middle East Section (EMES). Established in 1937 FWCC's purpose is to endeavor to reach and build bridges across the various theological traditions and cultural differences among Friends globally and to give opportunity to Quakers from all traditions to meet, worship and share our common heritage. As well as EMES, FWCC comprises a World Office (in London) and 3 other regional Sections: Africa, the Americas and Asia West Pacific.

EMES helps Friends in Europe & the Middle East connect with each other, and holds an Annual Meeting of representatives each spring, a monthly online youth group and peace & service network, and from time to time brings Friends together around a specific theme. The FWCC World Office, where it is felt appropriate, tries to present a Quaker voice and message at a global level, and to represent Friends on the global stage. This is particularly evident in its role of oversight for the two Quaker United Nations Offices in Geneva and New York, and in its developing work on both sustainability and issues of privilege and historical injustice related to colonialism. FWCC plans and holds World Plenary Meetings every 7-10 years and the next such meeting will be in 2030. FWCC will hold an online Global Conference of Friends in 2027 to consider issues around historic and ongoing injustice in the world.

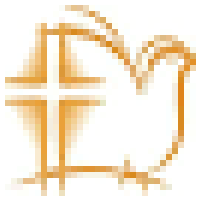

Quaker Council for European Affairs (QCEA)

QCEA brings a vision of peace, justice and equality to Europe and its institutions. We advocate for a new approach to security, focusing on nonviolent approaches to conflict. We promote policies that recognise the intrinsic equality of all people everywhere and reduce fear of the 'other'. In addition to our staff in Brussels, QCEA is governed and supported by Quaker communities from across

EAPPI is an international programme, overseen by the World Council of Churches, which sends ordinary people from around the world to act as Ecumenical Accompaniers in Palestine. They accompany vulnerable communities, monitor human rights abuses for the UN and other agencies, and share the real-life stories of the Palestinians and Israelis who they meet.

EAPPI UK & Ireland is coordinated by Quakers in Britain. We are nonviolent and non-partisan and advocate in partnership with Palestinians, Israelis and the international community. We work for an end to the occupation and apartheid in Palestine, based on international law, and for a just peace with security and dignity for all.
